The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in 2021 has been prepared by the Monastic Community of Grandchamp in Switzerland. The theme that was chosen, "Abide in my love and you shall bear much fruit", is based on John 15:1-17 and expresses the Grandchamp Community's vocation to prayer, reconciliation and unity in the Church and the human family.

Each year Christian Aid provides the <u>Go and Do action points</u> for each of the daily reflections – linking into the important work of Christian Aid in the relief of poverty and advocacy of justice. "Each day during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, we provide a starting point, reflection, questions and a prayer based on the theme." Use this link to go to the Christian Aid daily prayers and actions. For those who can't use the link here are a few of the suggestions:-

Day 1 Pray for action on global refugee and asylum issues and campaigns. These are bound up with many other issues, such as the multiple reasons that have forced someone to leave their home, conflict, climate change, Coronavirus etc.

Day 2 Give thanks and pray for the children you know. Pray for the day when children across the world will be given equal opportunities to thrive and live an abundant life.

Day 3 Consider the clothing in your wardrobe and the people who have touched them. Have these clothes been made with fair pay and good working conditions? Continue to raise your voice for the cause of Fairtrade and choose Fairtrade whenever you can.

Day 4 Pray in solidarity with Christians all over the world, brothers and sisters living in diverse situations, experiencing diverse problems and sharing diverse gifts.

Day 5 Read the Beatitudes through slowly (Matthew 5: 3-11). Which of the actions described in the passage are you encouraged to take today?

Day 6 Contribute in any way that you can to a foodbank, food growing scheme or community meal initiative in your area.

Day 7 Pray for **ACT Alliance**, the largest coalition of Protestant and Orthodox churches and church-related organisations engaged in humanitarian, development and advocacy work in the world. It has more than 130 members working together in over 120 countries. It aims to create positive and sustainable change in the lives of poor and marginalised people regardless of their religion, politics, gender, sexual orientation, race or nationality. All its work is in keeping with the highest international codes and standards.

Day 8 Think about how our church expresses care for God's world in worship and teaching; in how we look after your buildings and land; in how we engage with our local community and in global campaigns, and in the personal lifestyles of our congregation.

Christ Church has now formally been accepted as part of the Inclusive Church Network.

This week nationally is the **Big Energy Saving Week** - a national campaign to help people cut their fuel bills and get all the financial support they are entitled to. The week focuses on raising public awareness of how to switch energy supplier or tariff to get the best deal, access discounts and make homes energy efficient. This is the 8th Big Energy Saving Week and is a partnership between Citizens Advice, the Energy Saving Trust and the Department of Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy with the support of numerous organisations, charities and companies.

And, today (21 Jan) is **International Hugging Day!** Obviously, a bit difficult in the current lockdown – but maybe give someone a virtual hug – phone a friend, send a text or Whatsapp or an actual handwritten card – letting people know you'd hug them if you could! It's good to share love, even if we can't do it physically!

CHILDREN'S SPACE – see attached Children's & Families News DEVOTION

This week's devotion comes from the weekend food magazine – bear with me – it's proof that you can find theology in anything! Grace Dent has written amusingly and with surprising depth for a restaurant critic, throughout the pandemic. It seems that she is now 'holed up' in the north for lockdown, caring for her mother who has terminal cancer. She talks about how 'sweet treats' are alleviating the boredom of both January and lockdown, but rather than paraphrase, here are some excerpts in her own words:

"Each day, I promise myself: "Less sugar, fewer carbohydrates", but I am yet to measure out mam's morphine at 2am and then crave a rocket salad with an oil-free dressing. My mother, 84, and with more comebacks than Status Quo behind her, feels similarly. Occasions such as this need the big guns. Hot buttered toast laden with enough marmalade to make Paddington rethink the chest size of his duffle coat...

I'm unsure what your personal pain is, but there's a lot of it about at present. The sadness seeps quietly from all of us. If you find yourself in an argument, the chances are your opponent is not actually angry with you personally. They were merely carrying their anger when they happened upon your person, and you are merely collateral damage. And in that moment you are the embodiment of another three months of homeschooling or their father's missing second vaccination jab. You are their forthcoming rent, their vanishing career and their dwindling savings...

I often go to Booths [local shop] after 9pm, when I'm almost the only customer in the store...Sometimes I head back to the veg section to languish for a while by the reduced-price brussels sprouts, just so I can shamelessly enjoy a few more moments of music [on her phone with headphones] and hide from terms such as "comfort care" and "palliative"...

Banoffee pie was yellow-stickered down from £3.80 to £1.20 yesterday. So pleasing with tea and *Tipping Point*. I have trouble believing in an interventionist God lately, but I do believe He offers small mercies."




Sandy will start training new mentors this month.
