Advance notice – 14 March, Mothering Sunday. Mothering Sunday is the day we honour mothers and mother churches. On Mothering Sunday, Christians have historically visited their mother church - the church in which they received their baptism. It has of course for a long time been linked to the secular Mother's Day. Since this year we will again be unable to visit our mothers, or have children visit those of us who are mothers, I thought it might be nice, if you would like to, to have a picture of your mother handy and visible during the service. The **Hadeel Craft Workshop in Gaza** where they employ deaf and blind workers to make beautiful products. These are also available at their shop in Edinburgh at <u>www.hadeel.org</u> The tour is sponsored by Edinburgh Fairtrade City.

Meet the Farmers behind the Fairtrade tea and coffee produced in Kenya. (**Café Direct**) They discuss how climate change affects the growers and the challenges involved. Fairtrade Africa has also donated money to help with management of the pandemic there. It has donated 13 million towards awareness and the cost of necessary precautions for the workers.

Creativity against the Climate Crisis This was introduced by Adjoa Andoh, a Fairtrade Foundation Patron. It involved work being done by artists, activists and academics designing posters, cartoons and music to make people aware of climate change.

As in previous years, both churches are taking a **Lent collection for Water Aid's 'Jars of Change' appeal**. Molia lives in Mozambique, a country highly vulnerable to cyclones, extreme droughts and flooding. Before WaterAid constructed a solar-powered water system in her community, she had to walk 5km to the nearest water source. Now the community has clean, sustainable drinking water.

The summary and questions for this week were in last week's N&C. Here is next week's:

Week 3 The Age of Humans

Human beings are having a rapid, deep and long-lasting effect on our planet. Scientists have coined a new word for this; we are now living in the 'Anthropocene' era.

Wherever we look, human beings have drastically changed God's creation, so that it is hard to find unspoilt, pristine nature anywhere. And yet, we buy into the popular belief that we are small and the planet is big, therefore nothing we do can have a planet-scale impact. Every natural disaster reinforces the idea of nature's awesome power over humans – yet it is climate change that is increasing the frequency and power of hurricanes, storms and fires.

Often the people most affected by climate change are those living in poorer countries. This is grossly unfair, as they have done the least to cause climate change! That is why big charities like Oxfam and Christian Aid are so committed to campaigning on climate change.

Old Testament prophets spoke out about injustice – Isaiah 58:6-8 And of course Jesus did too, Luke 14:13-14 (just one example of many)

Group Questions

1. **Read Psalm 8** If God has put human beings in charge of creation, why are we so often reluctant to acknowledge this?

2. The way we live affects the lives of people on the other side of the world... How could we, personally or as a church, act in a way that reflects this?

3. We need to join forces with all those who care about God's creation, believers and non-believers. Is joining forces with non-believers practical? How can we go about it?

4. Do you feel hope or despair when you think about the future of our planet?

Questions for individual reflection

You may like to consider these on your own:

- Are you for or against nuclear power? Why?
- Are you for or against genetically modified crops? Why?
