Welcome to the joint weekly newsletter of Christ Church and the Bridgwater Drive Church.

Both churches are now open for Sunday Worship, with restrictions. While the online service will remain 'joint' each church will have its own service as pre-pandemic. For the foreseeable future, the online service will be live-streamed from the church where the minister is leading, but always on the Christ Church Facebook page as it has been from March 2020.

The same rules as last time the church was open apply:

- Social distancing, which means a capacity of around 30 people (CC) and 12 (BDC). Please 'book' a place with Pat Botfield (01245 320212, pat.botfield@btinternet.com) or Margaret (07890 1623220 margaretbates'blueyonder.co.uk).
- Face coverings need to be worn inside
- No congregational singing
- No socialising in groups of more than 6 inside the building or in the area outside the door

This Sunday, 30 May, the Minister will lead the service at Bridgwater Drive, where it will be Communion, and the service will be live-streamed from there on the Christ Church Facebook page (as usual BUT at 10.30am). Joyce will lead the service at Christ Church (not Communion).

Sunday 6 June (Environment Day) the Minister will lead the service at Christ Church and the service will be live-streamed from there at 10am. **Margaret will lead a 'Church Family Service at Bridgwater Drive at 10.30am.** For this service everyone is invited to contribute by letting Margaret have suggestions for a hymn, a prayer, a Bible reading, a poem, a story, a memory or anything they want to share with the church family. It will be really helpful if you can say why you've chosen a particular hymn, prayer or reading. To mark World Environment Day Tearfund are inviting people to join in a national day of prayer on **Saturday**, **5**th **June**.

Prayer in the Park is a prayer event uniting people and churches across the UK as we celebrate the beauty of God's world, repent for the damage we've done, and seek God's heart for a sustainable future. Just days after the event, world leaders will meet for the G7 summit in Cornwall to discuss how to build back better from the coronavirus pandemic and create a greener and fairer future for all.

TIPS & IDEAS

This week's idea from #64MillionArtists is provided by again by the mental health charity CALM:

The Museum of Us: What are the objects and artefacts that you would find in a museum about you? What are the moments and stories those things capture? How might those objects, memories and experiences connect to another person's story?

Collect the objects or things around you that help to capture you as a person.

You could choose anything from your favourite tea, to an old photograph, to your favourite book. Perhaps they are every day, ordinary things - or perhaps they tell extraordinary stories. **What do they mean to you?**



Arrange your objects into a display. Capture your display in photographs, words, or in a sketch.

I have rather a lot of things on my desk, some from my childhood, some gifts, some bought more recently, so I collected some of them together. Though I think calling it a 'museum of me' is probably stretching it!

Opening interactive activity 'The Pitch'

Opening Activity- The Pitch

One member of the group is the decision maker. The other members of the group are each given a different idea to pitch (see below). After having a few minutes to gather their thoughts, they each will take it in turns to pitch their idea to the decision maker. The decision maker must then decide which pitch they found most convincing, discussing the reason they made this choice.

If your group is large you may wish to break into smaller groups or decide to have more than one decision maker.

The pitches:

Pitch one: The church should get pet chickens.

Pitch two: Every August the church services should be held outside.

Pitch three: Doughnuts should be served with the tea and coffee after church.

Pitch four: The church should host a monthly board games evening.

Pitch five: This year's nativity play should be a musical.

Purpose: to start to think about the importance of how an issue is framed and how this can influence decision makers.

Discussion questions:

Think about a few policy areas that are important to you or, if you're on line', discuss with members of your group:

- 1. What might a window of opportunity look like for this policy area?
- 2. What is the policy's overall image?—How do the public perceive this policy area? How do politicians perceive this policy area? How does the media cover this policy area?
- 3. What are the current dominant facts and values that are involved in shaping how this policy area is perceived?
- 4. What are the facts and values that we want to shape the way this policy area is perceived?
- 5. What might our faith have to say about this policy area? How can we frame this in a way that would appeal beyond the church without losing our distinctively Christian voice?

This event is for anyone from BOTH churches and we hope some friends from Bridgwater Drive will join us.



"It was just a slap that first time. Just a slap ... He never hit me on the face again. He didn't want any marks to be seen. Everything had to remain perfect on the outside."

Told in the first person, in the style of a conversational diary or letter, Isabel describes the lengths she has to go in escaping her abusive husband, including a death – but whose? Flashbacks tell the story of how they first met, moved in together, married. Only the love of her eccentric best friend Anna can save her.

Pre-publication review:

"Right to Possession portrays very well how much domestic abuse is conflictingly monotonous, the predictability and intensity of the love, then violence, obvious to all but the victim. The terrible destructiveness of domestic abuse to such a wide circle of people, not just the protagonists was palpable, as was the desperate difficulty for victims to escape the circle of abuse, and also how conflicted and imprisoned the abuser is within themselves [in the later part] I was so glued to the book that I actually stayed up until well gone I am one night to find out what happened and finish the book!"

Originally written some years ago, in 2021 following heightened awareness about violence against women, and the huge rise in domestic abuse and stalking, Right to Possession really comes into its own. A perfectly timed release of this death with a twist!

About the author

Naomi Young-Rodas published her first novel with TSL in 2020 (new edition from the 2008 original). She has an MA in Creative Writing from Manchester Metropolitan University and has previously had poetry published in numerous anthologies. She has lived in Switzerland, Guatemala and the USA and is now a minister of the United Reformed Church in Essex.

Here's a bit more information about raising money for Age UK by knitting or crocheting little hats to go on drinks bottles. The web site for 'The Big Knit' says:- 'We (Innocent) started putting little hats on our smoothies back in 2003, donating 25p to Age UK for every behatted bottle sold. These woolly masterpieces are knitted and crocheted by thousands of legendary volunteers. They sent us a whopping 1.5 million little hats for last year's Big Knit, bringing our total raised for Age UK over the years to just under £3 million. Jaw dropping stuff? Hats will be back on bottles in 2022, and we'd love to raise more for Age UK than ever. Anyone can get involved, whether you're a pro or a novice.'

Here is one pattern for knitting small pompom hats. There are lots more patterns on line for beginners and experts www.thebigknit.co.uk. For anyone who hasn't got a computer I've taken pictures of these so if you would like to try a different one let me know which one you want to try and I will print a pattern for you. If anyone has some wool I will try to knit one (if I can find the right size needles)! Morgawet

Blue and white Bobble Hat

Yarn - Blue and white DK Needles - 4mm

Hat

Cast on 31 stitches in white

Row 1: k1, *p1, k1 repeat fro * to end of row Row 2: p1, *k1, p1 repeat from * to end of row

Change to blue and beginning with a knit row work 12 rows in stocking stitch

Next row: k2together to last stitch, k1 (16 stitches)

Next row: purl

Next row: k2together to end (8 stitches)

Cut the yarn leaving approximately 10cm length. Thread this through a sewing needle and bring through stitches and pull up to tighten.

Making up

Use a sewing needle to join side seams.

Make a pompom in blue and sew securely to top of the hat.

Getting the hats to Age UK

Either send directly to Big Knit, Innocent Drinks, 342, Ladbroke Grove, London W10 5BU with a note that has your name and address, how many hats you've knitted and the date

Or let Margaret have your little hat(s) and she will send them from the church.
